TRANSLATION ENTREPRENEUR FUNDS NEW MODERN LANGUAGES BUILDING

Andrew Brode, who left King Edward's in 1959, has donated £2.5 million towards the next new development at King Edward's School. The £5m project comprises a new Modern Languages Department, extension and renewal of the science laboratories and a new Sixth Form Centre.

Andrew, who is the Executive Chairman of RWS Holdings plc, the world's leading patent translation and search company, said: "I am delighted to be able to make this gift to my old school to ensure that the school stays amongst the very best in the teaching of languages. Languages were important to me when I studied at the school and have remained important to me throughout my career."

Languages are more important at King Edward's now than ever, as every boy takes at least one modern language to IGCSE and, since the introduction of the International Baccalaureate, every boy in the Sixth Form continues to study at least one language.

The Chief Master, John Cloughton, said, "This is a gift of great scale and significance. It will enable us to create a state-of-the-art Modern Languages Department. The teaching of Modern Languages is very important to this school, at a time when there are concerns about language teaching in this country. The school has been consistently successful in getting boys into the best universities to read languages and I can't see that changing."

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN



In 2010's report I wrote that raising £1m in our first year was a remarkable result. Well, thanks to your support, in 2011 we raised £3.1m so I have now run out of superlatives! I would like to thank each and every donor listed at the end of this report for making this happen.

Particular thanks goes to Andrew Brode (1959) whose donation of £2.5m to fund a new modern languages building at the school is one of the largest gifts made to a UK school by an individual. The first phase of this building programme includes the recently opened Ruddock Performing Arts Centre, another extraordinary facility made possible by the exceptional generosity of a former pupil.

Finally I would like to thank all those who supported our Assisted Places Fund last year, especially donors such as Tim Clarke and Chris Gill (featured in this report) who are sponsoring individual pupils. We have now raised over £2m for Assisted Places in the last two years and, as a result of this, from September 2012 there will be 33 boys in the school funded by your donations. Our long-term aim is to fund at least 100 additional places and we are already one-third of the way to this goal – a goal I am sure, thanks to your support, we will reach quicker than any of the trustees imagined.

ASSISTED PLACE TO REMEMBER FORMER CHIEF MASTER

Chris Gill, whose Step-Grandfather Commander Sidney Langley was Acting Chief Master at King Edward's from 1941 to 1943, is funding a place in his name.

Commander Langley taught Chemistry and became Second Master before taking the role of Acting Chief Master for five terms during the Second World War. This was a time of some difficulty for the school as a number of boys who left in the Fifts had been lost in the war, bombing had begun, and there was regular news of OEs killed in action.

Although Chris did not attend King Edward's, he feels he owes a lot to

Langley as he was instrumental in persuading his parents that he should go to university. After reading an article on Assisted Places in The Times, Chris contacted King Edward's and decided to fund a place.

Chris said: "Sidney appeared in my life when I was seven and became a discreet but powerful influence, even coaching me in Latin and Maths. It is a privilege to keep his memory alive through this Assisted Place, and contact with the school has allowed me greater insight into his contribution to and standing in the school's history."

PARENT SPONSORS ASSISTED PLACE

On hearing that his second son to attend King Edward's would be following in his older brother's footsteps to the University of Oxford, Tim Clarke decided to fund an Assisted Place to give another boy the opportunity his sons had enjoyed.

Oliver Clarke (2011) will be reading Classics at New College and William Clarke (2008) has been reading Chemistry at Worcester College. Tim, who is also a Foundation Governor, has previously supported the Assisted

Places Fund, but decided that he now wanted to fully sponsor a boy of outstanding academic promise.

Tim said: "Both of our sons have been able to go to Oxford as a result of their education at KES. As a family we wished to mark our gratitude by funding a free place for another boy's seven years at the school. We want this great school to be open to all boys on merit, whatever their parental circumstances."

LEAVING A LEGACY

Peter Trevis (1953) will be leaving a legacy to the Trust, which will fully fund at least four Assisted Places at any one time, in perpetuity.

Peter contacted the school last year to enquire about leaving a legacy. Peter's twin brother, John, died in 1999 and he decided to leave a legacy in both of their names.

Peter said: "This legacy will help the school to continue its great tradition of being open to all boys of ability, whatever their family background. What better way to repay in some small measure the debt we owe to King Edward's and to ensure that its future is as distinguished as its past?"

The Assisted Places will be specifically used to support pupils from state primary schools in Birmingham. John and Peter attended Berton Road Primary School in Yardley, and then Camp Hill before coming to King Edward's in 1946.

REHEARSAL ROOM NAMED IN RECOGNITION OF DONOR

In recognition of John Osborn's substantial donations to the school and his love of music, the rehearsal room for the orchestra in the Ruddock Performing Arts Centre has been named the 'Osborn Room'. This room sits where the original school music room would have been during John's time at the school.

John Osborn (1962) is currently funding an extraordinary 11 Assisted Places for musically talented boys. Two of these boys are in the National Youth Orchestra, one of whom is the current leader.

John forged a business career following his time at King Edward's, specialising in turning round the fortune of failing companies. "When I was young my father suffered from illness," said John. "My parents could never have afforded to pay for me to go to a school like this. But I was educated there, and later at Sidney Sussex College, Cambridge, entirely free. It seemed fairly logical to try and put something back in to both institutions."

SIR PAUL AND LADY RUDDOCK PERFORMING ARTS CENTRE OPENS

The new £11m performing arts centre for King Edward's School and King Edward VI High School for Girls officially opened on Friday, 27th April 2012.

Sir Paul Ruddock, who left King Edward's in 1976, provided a substantial donation towards the development which comprises a 400-seater auditorium, 120-seater drama studio, state-of-the-art dance and rehearsal rooms, and music facilities.

Sir Paul Ruddock, Chairman of the Victoria and Albert Museum whom

received a knighthood in the New Year Honour List 2012 for services to the arts and philanthropy, said: "King Edward's was a great springboard for me in terms of education but it also opened the world of culture and history which have been my passions ever since.

"My hope is that the boys and girls who use this concert hall and the dance and drama studios will see their passions ignited and set them on a path that fulfils them as much as mine fulfils me."

FORMER KEHS PUPIL LEAVES A MUSICAL LEGACY

Throughout her life both KEHS and KES played a very important part, in particular she was a great supporter of music in the two schools and rarely missed a concert. In 2011, Margaret offered to provide funding for a new organ for the Performing Arts Centre, the first performance on which took place at the Donor Concert in May 2012.

Tragically Margaret passed away just two months before the opening of the Ruddock Performing Arts Centre, a building she would have enjoyed. There is a plaque in her name on the organ and her legacy also funded the programme for the opening concert, a fitting tribute for a woman that loved music at the schools.

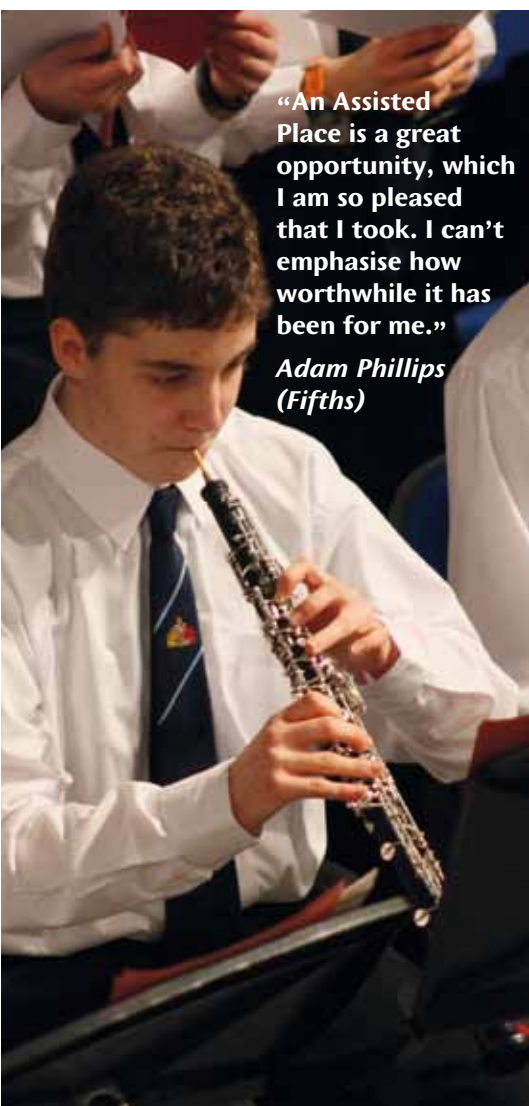

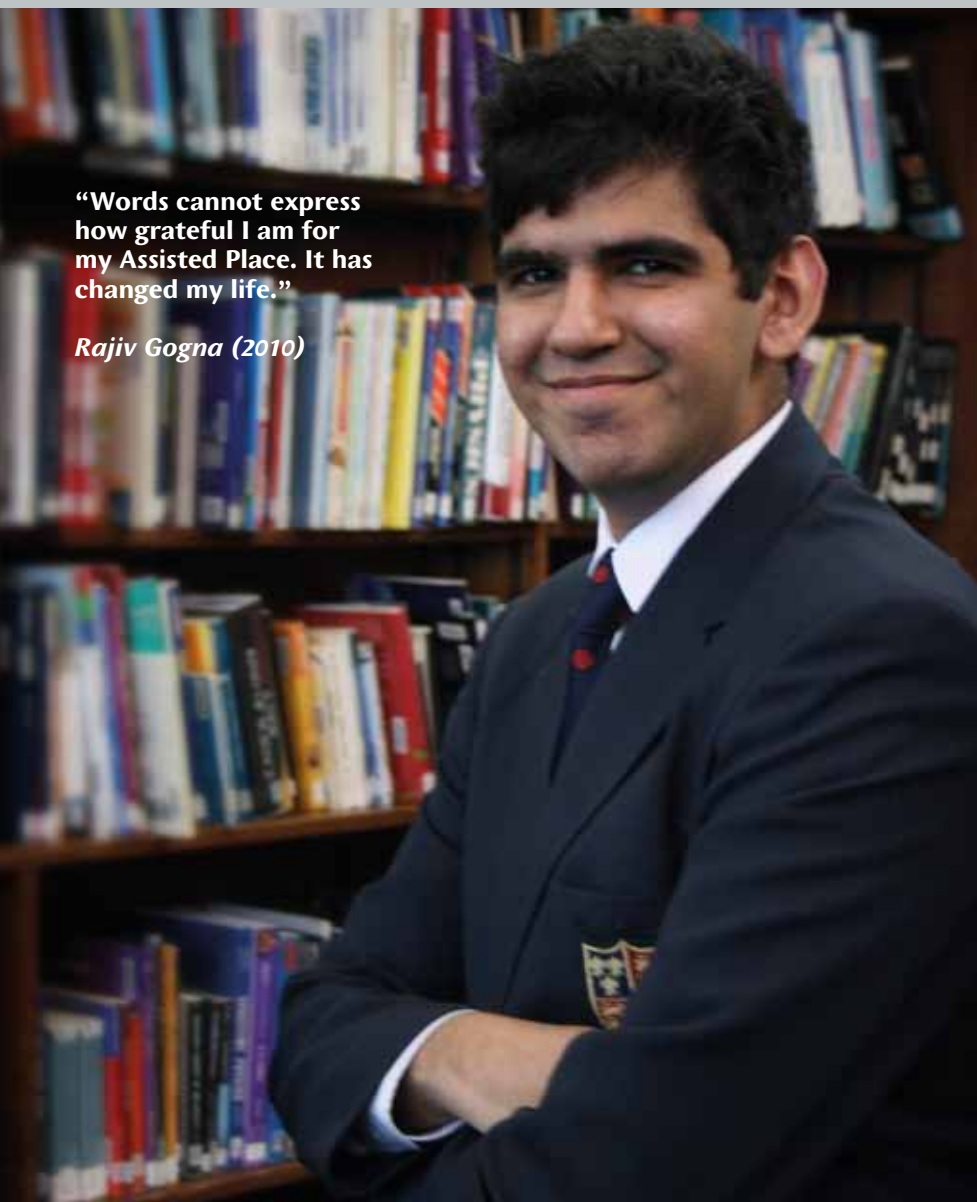

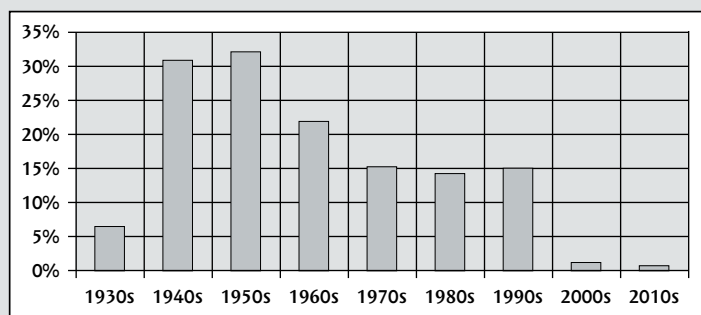

INCOME BY FUND

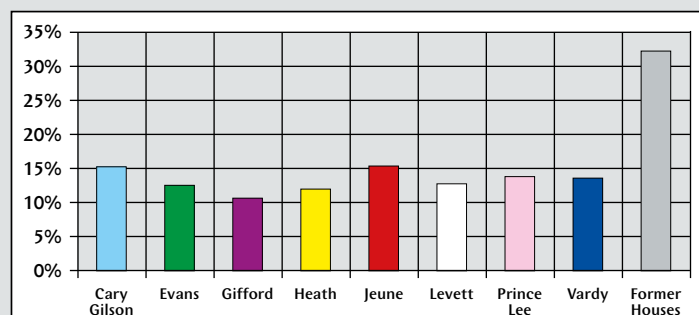
